

**Frank Stutenberg, Once Colony  
Postmaster, Died at Quincy**

Funeral services for J. F. H. Stutenberg, Civil War veteran, a postmaster for ten years at Colony, where he was also in the mercantile business and served as a justice of the peace for some years and on the school board for nearly forty years, were conducted Tuesday of last week at the chapel of the Soldier's and Sailors' Home at Quincy by the Rev. G. E. Newton of Paris, Mo., a former pastor. Burial was in the Home cemetery, following a burial service conducted by the G. A. R. and veterans of the Spanish American War.

Mr. Stutenberg, who was 85 years old, died Sunday morning, May 4, at the Soldier's and Sailors' Home. He is survived by his wife and ten children and a half-brother, Theodore Stutenberg, of Keokuk, Iowa.

Frank Stutenberg, as he was generally known, was born in St. Louis in 1844. When a mere child his parents moved to Quincy, where they died a few years later. From there the son went to Clark County, Missouri, where he worked on a farm near Wayland for a number of years.

He then came to Knox County where he married a Miss Carder, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Carder. To them were born eleven children, one of whom is dead.

For more than three years Mr. Stutenberg served in the Union army during the Civil War. Upon his return from the war he farmed a few years and then entered the mercantile business at Colony.

He was a member of the I. O. O. F. Lodge and the G. A. R.
